Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so that a runner may read it.


For there is still a vision for the appointed time; it speaks of the end and does not lie.

Look at the proud! Their spirit is not right in them, but the righteous live by their faithfulness.




C receive our prayer.

Grape juice is available by request at the chancel rail.


After receiving the elements, you may return to your seats.

- C Amen.



Commemorations This Week:

Mon, Oct 6: William Tyndale, translator, martyr, died 1536

Tyndale was ordained a priest in England, and wished to translate the Bible into English. He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany. He completed the New Testament in 1525, but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.

Tue, Oct 7: Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died 1787

Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work. Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. Among other accomplishments, his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888.

Fri, Oct 10: Massie L. Kennard, renewer of the church, died 1986 (TFF)

A native of Chicago, Kennard was a major figure in supporting and working toward ethnic and racial inclusiveness in the former Lutheran Church in America. Ordained in 1958, he served in positions including Director for Minority Concerns of the Division for Mission in North America.
